

On October 24, 2024, the Department of History at Sarbati Devi Women's College, Rajgangpur, hosted a seminar on "The Role of Gandhi in India's Independence Movement." Mr.. Sachin Minj, Head of the Department, delivered the welcome address, highlighting Gandhi's legacy of non-violence and unity. Ms. Reena Tete, Lecturer in History from B.R. Science College, Kendrapada, served as the resource person, captivating the audience with her insights. She detailed the Non-Cooperation Movement (1920-22), which united Indians through boycotts of British institutions and goods. The 1930 Salt March was emphasized as a bold 240-mile protest against the salt tax, sparking widespread defiance. Ms. Tete discussed the 1942 Quit India Movement, a call for immediate British exit amid fierce repression. Gandhi's Satyagraha philosophy of truth-force was praised for inspiring global civil rights and India's 1947 freedom. Mrs. Surekha Lakra, Lecturer in History, gave the vote of thanks, thanking all for a session that revived Gandhian values.

On November 19, 2024, the Department of History at Sarbati Devi Women's College, Raigangpur, organized a insightful departmental seminar titled "The Fall of the Roman Empire: Internal and External Factors," presented by two diligent students, Alka Minz and Anjali Tirkey. The event commenced with a warm welcome address delivered by the Head of the Department, Sachim Minj, who emphasized the enduring relevance of studying ancient civilizations like Rome to understand contemporary geopolitical shifts and the fragility of empires. In their well-structured presentation, Alka Minz and Anjali Tirkey meticulously explored the multifaceted causes behind the collapse of the Western Roman Empire in 476 CE. Internally, they highlighted economic stagnation marked by hyperinflation, heavy taxation, and agricultural decline; political instability fueled by frequent emperor assassinations and civil wars; and social decay through widespread corruption, loss of civic virtue, and the burdensome reliance on slave labor that stifled innovation. Externally, the duo delved into relentless barbarian invasions by Germanic tribes such as the Visigoths and Vandals, exacerbated by Rome's overstretched military frontiers and diplomatic failures, alongside pressures from the rising Sassanid Empire in the East. Drawing on primary sources like Gibbon's "Decline and Fall" and archaeological evidence, the presenters argued that these intertwined factors created a perfect storm, leading to the empire's fragmentation and the dawn of the Middle Ages. The seminar sparked engaging discussions among faculty and students, underscoring the timeless lessons in resilience and governance. Concluding the proceedings, Surekha Lakra extended a heartfelt vote of thanks to the presenters for their scholarly depth, the HOD for her guidance, and all attendees for their active participation, fostering a vibrant academic atmosphere in the department.
